Susan White: Video Stitch

Not part of time:base:behavior, but related in media and theme is Kansas City artist Susan White's Video Stitch at Jenkins. Video Stitch is an interactive time-based tapestry of social environments that weaves the mundane with the meditative and celebratory. Individual images from five local establishments are shown on several monitors separately so that each screen acts as a quilting square. Video images are moving and no longer than five minutes, and all the images are close-ups.

Included in the piece are images from Baptist Temple of Kansas City's Voices Choir, Waldo Pets, Woodside Tennis and Health Club, Car Wash 103, and Golden Star, an industrial rug and mop manufacturer.

The addition of a sound loop from each of these environments completes the installation. Like a quilt, the sounds are laid next to each other to complement and bring recognition to each.

The syncopated footsteps of a patron on a StairMaster at Woodside Health Club contrasted with the almost hypnotic silence of a Waldo Pets aquarium. Images of a fish bowl have the added element of being tongue-in-cheek. They may not have been included for a giggle, but they handily remind viewers of their own voyeurism, not to mention White's stated purpose of being a lure to the downtown area.

Likewise, the images of spools of string from Golden Star add depth to this digital quilt.

Also supported by the Urban Culture Project, Video Stitch's intention is to bring people from familiar environments to the center of the city to reconnect with downtown Kansas City and vice versa. The installation will be on view through July 9. Jenkins is located at 1217 Walnut. Video screening hours are 8 to 11 p.m. Thursday-Saturday.
